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LRCN attends IFLA conference in Puerto Rico

The IFLA 2011 Conference attracted 2593 participants from many countries across the globe. Fifteen librarians from Nigeria attended the 77th IFLA Conference held from 13 - 18 August, 2011 in San Juan, Puerto Rico. Two Nigerian Diaspora librarians also participated in the conference. The conference was organised into 219 congress sessions, 165 poster sessions, meetings and exhibitions. The Conference attracted over 80 exhibitors all over the globe. Visits to many libraries and places of interest was also organised. The cultural night was of high quality where participants enjoyed themselves in form of dance and fun. It was a well organised conference, as many participants expressed satisfaction with the organisation of the event. Highlights of the conference are as follows:

Election and Awards
Election of the Registrar/CEO of Librarians' Registration Council of Nigeria (LRCN), Ms Victoria Okojie as the Chair of IFLA Africa Section.



The 2012 Jay Jordan IFLA/OCLC Earlier Career Development Fellow was awarded to Mrs. Ngozi Ukachi, University of Lagos Library and four others. The first Nigerian to be so awarded.

Professor Paul Sturges, formerly of Loughborough University of Technology, UK won the IFLA medal award for 2011.

Coming IFLA Conferences

The next IFLA Conference will be held in Helsinki, Finland from 15 - 22 August, 2012 with the theme "Libraries Now: Inspiring, Surprising and Empowering".

Singapore was chosen as the venue for the 2013 IFLA Conference, it will be held 13 - 17 August, 2013.

Meeting of Nigerians

A meeting of Nigerian participants was hosted by the Registrar of LRCN on Tuesday 16th August 2011. At the meeting the Chair of IFLA Africa Section solicited for the cooperation of all to succeed. The Chair of IFLA Africa Section tabled the possibility of Nigeria hosting of IFLA 2015 conference which has been ceded to Africa. Members present at the meeting were strongly of the view that Nigeria should bid for the hosting of 2015 conference with the fact that Kenya (1983) and South Africa (2007) have hosted IFLA conference

before.

A three member steering committee was constituted to work out the modalities of securing the bid. The committee consists of the Director/CEO of the National Library of Nigeria (NLN), the Registrar/CEO of LRCN and the President of Nigerian Library Association (NLA).

LRCN at the Northumbria International Conference, UK

The 9th Northumbria International Conference on Performance Measurement in Libraries and Information Services, a biennial conference was held at the University of York, Yorkshire U.K between August 22 and 26, 2011. The Conference with the theme "proving value in challenging Times" was held at the Exhibition Hall of the University and it attracted about two hundred participants from across the globe, among them was the Deputy Director Professional Services, LRCN Abuja, Mr J. J. Olowookere.

The Conference which attracted professional librarians, vendors and publishers word wide dwell extensively on impact assessment of the value of library and information services to the enviroment they are located. Major attention of the assessment impact of the Conference was on academic libraries with emphasizes on the determination of the protocols that can be used as an instrument to achieve the needed result in the value assessment process.

The major protocols that were discussed in the conference which were seen to be valuable instrument for performance assessment in academic libraries are: LibQUAL, DigiQUAL, ClimateQUAL and MINES for

libraries. The foremost among the protocols is LibQUAL+ (R) which is a total market survey intended to help library staff understand user perceptions, thereby improve library service quality and better meet users' information needs.

The conveyor of the conference, Mr. Stephen Town emphasized the need for a periodic meeting of librarians to share experiences on the performance of their libraries and reason together on how service delivery can be improved. In all one hundred and fifty six papers were presented with the parallel sessions divided into three strands namely; impact/value strand, quality strand and statistics strand.

The closing keynote speeches titled Conferences past, future and present were delivered by Prof. Sheila Corral of University of Sheffield and Steve Hiller of University of Washington.

The high point of the conference is the focus on what value the library is expected to have on its immediate environment.

On several occasions, seminars/workshops have been held in different parts of the country all geared towards the attainment of the thrust of this write up. Over the years, political office holders and government officials have found these papers and articles very useful blueprints for running official affairs and

planning.

Nonetheless, practitioners of library and information science profession have also distinct themselves in the aspect of facilitating or rather enhancing knowledge acquisition through the promotion of reading culture among students, professionals and people from all walks of life.

This indeed, is a wholesome attempt at capacity building which is no doubt an integral part of nation building. Also to this effect, a number of campaigns and public lectures have been held.
